#### POLICE ORDER No. 242

SUBJECT—Preparation and submission of statistics relating to juvenile offenders

In order to make a systematic study and analysis of the factors that breed juvenile lapses with the object of co-ordinating information available on the problem and devise preventive methods after more careful survey of the extent and nature of the problem, a Juvenile Delinquency Bureau has been opened in C. I. D., Crime Branch. In order to make the Bureau effective, it is necessary that periodical returns and statistics should be furnished in the presecribed pro forma. The following statements and information are therefore ordered to be submitted by the District Superintendents of Police so as to reach the C. I. D., Crime Branch, Cuttack within the stipulated period. This supersedes I.G. P's, letter No. 3672 (14), dated 19th June 1957 and No. 6376, dated 26th May 1959.

# (i) Quarterly statement on Juvenile Delinquency

In the begining of each quarter, Superintendents of Police should submit the information as per Appendix I. It should reach C. I. D., Crime Branch by 15th of January, April, July and October. The information should be collected with extreme care.

### (2) Personal Roll of the Juvenile Delinquents

As soon as a case is charge-sheeted against a juvenile delinquent either singly or in collaboration with adults, a personal history-sheet vide Appendix II should be prepared in tirplicate by the I. O., two copies of which should be sent to the District Superintendents of Police. The District S. P. should retain one copy in the D. C. I. B. Crime Section and send the other copy to C. I. D., Crime Branch. Steps are being taken to print this histroy-sheet form as a new form vide P. M. Form No. 74-A. The Superintendents of Police would indent these forms from Government Press. Till such forms are printed, cyclostyled forms in stoud papers should be prepared and distributed to the Polic-Stations so that no difficulty is experienced by the I. Os. to prepare the history-sheets at the time of submission of charge-sheets. It may be noted that the juveniles include persons of either sex within the age-group of 7 to 21 years. The Investigating Officers should go through the history-sheets carefully and extract all information relating to the juvenile delinqients. A good deal of care and interest is necessary to collect the information by making local enquiries and ascertaining facts from the Juveniles.

As soon as a case ends in conviction/acquital, the fact should be intimated to C. I. D., Crime Branch for making the records up-to-date.

The offences for which information is required are enumerated vide Appendix III.
